

Import Requirements to Protect New Jersey Livestock from New World Screwworm

To help safeguard livestock and protect public health, the New Jersey Department of Agriculture (NJDA) and the New Jersey Department of Health (NJDOH) have implemented new movement requirements and restrictions for domestic animals entering New Jersey. These requirements must be met before animals are transported into the state.

At this time, the risk to New Jersey livestock remains very low. However, please follow the recommendations provided by Dr. Monique Obsharski:

- Animals originating from an infested zone are not permitted to enter New Jersey. Current infested zones include, southwest, central, and west Texas, as well as the entire state of New Mexico.
- Animals originating from an area adjacent to an infested zone must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within five (5) days prior to travel.
- Animals that have traveled through an infested zone must be treated with an approved product, such as Dectomax or Exzolt, before entering New Jersey.
